
AKOGHS – To connect Alaskans and the Broader Community to the History of Oil and Gas in Alaska

Early Days of Alaska's Oil & Gas Industry

1902

First Commercial Production

Occurs on private land near Katalla. This led to Alaska Territory's first refinery.

1923

President Harding Creates National Petroleum Reserve No. 4

> Sets aside 23 million acres in Northern Alaska to provide an emergency oil supply for the U.S. Navy.

1957

Swanson River Oil Field

Field discovered on July 19, 1957, after 165 consecutive unsuccessful wells had been drilled in Alaska.

1959

Statehood

First offshore Cook Inlet lease sale, Kenai gas field discovered.

1960

ANWR Established

President Eisenhower establishes 8.9 million-acre Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

Cook Inlet Gas Field

Sterling gas field discovered in Cook Inlet, Production begins at Swanson River oil field.

1962

Beluga River Gas Field

Beluga River Gas Field discovered on Kenai Peninsula.

1062

1837 – First Indication of Petroleum on the North Slope

Thomas Simpson with Hudson Bay Company (first white man to reach Point Barrow from the east) finds "two pieces of pitch coal" in the flood plain of the Babbage River that had washed down the river.

1853 – Oil in Cook Inlet

Fur traders for the Russian-American Company notice oil seep on the west side of Cook Inlet.

1869 – First Published Report of Petroleum in Alaska

William H. Dall, Ph.D., writes "Alaska and Its Resources." On page 259 of that book, he writes "The first inlet of importance on the Alaska Peninsula is Katmai. Here Jurassic fossils were found. On a lake in the vicinity petroleum is floating."

1882 – First Samples Collected on the Iniskin Peninsula

A Russian named Paveloff collects samples from an oil seep near Oil Bay on the Iniskin Peninsula on the west side of Cook Inlet.

1892 – Oil Claims Staked – First Attempt at Petroleum Development in Alaska


A prospector named Edelman stakes oil claims in the Iniskin Peninsula. His claims are near the low divide between the headwaters of Bowser Creek. Bowser Creek flows past at least one oil seep into Oil Bay.

AKOGHS – Collecting

• Oral history is a field of study and a method of gathering, preserving and interpreting the voices and memories of people, communities, and participants in past events. Oral history is both the oldest type of historical inquiry, predating the written word, and one of the most modern, initiated with tape recorders in the 1940s and now using 21st-century digital technologies.

Ross Warner of Anchorage, Alaska, died in his home surrounded by his family on Sept. 11, 2023. He was 92 years old.

He was born on June 7, 1931, in Dubuque, Iowa, to Cleona and Walter Warner.

Raised in Duluth, Minn., he graduated from Central High School, class of 1949. He received a B.S. degree in physics and mathematics from Gustavus Adolphus College and married Elaine Winquist in 1953. After serving in the Marine Corps, Ross spent 12 years with Schlumberger Inc., in several capacities in the Rocky Mountain region. He moved to Alaska in 1969 and, in 1978, began working for British Petroleum Alaska. He retired from BP as Well Interventions Team Leader and continued working with Petrotechnical Resources of Alaska as a contractor for BP after taking time off for a bucket list ski trip through Canada. He left the industry at age 83.


